A Message from our Dean Cathedrals in places of loss and hope

In 2015, I attended the North American Deans Conference in Jerusalem. It was a great opportunity to represent our Cathedral, meet colleagues and experience the Holy Land. Given the location, the number of participants was not as large as it usually is. The experience nonetheless was inspirational, collegial and life-giving. It was particularly unique to attend this gathering in 2015, in the sense that we as a Cathedral, and I as your vicar then, were living in between times.

This year, the Conference took place in Erie, Pennsylvania, at a time when we have been affirmed by Convention and Chapter and have started to live into our new iteration of self as a Cathedral in the 21st century. I arrived in Erie feeling a sense of hope and excitement to share some of the new things our Cathedral and ECCT are trying on.

The theme of the Conference was "Cathedrals in Places of Loss and Hope". Eighty deans and spouses from Cathedrals in the United States, Canada, Bahamas and England gathered for thoughtful conversation, fellowship and worship. I regret that my dear husband Daniel was not able to join me.) The travel in itself was not pleasant (My suitcase arrived a day later.) However, the hospitality of Bishop Sean Rowe and Dean Downey, his wife Sharon, and volunteers of the cathedral congregation highly transformed my experience.

The depth of our conversations and presentations by our presenters Sister Joan Chittister and the Very Rev. John Whitcombe, Dean of the cathedral in Coventry, England, shaped our time together. Additionally, there was space to share about the challenges and opportunities cathedrals are facing in this time and age. I am deeply blessed by the opportunity to gather with clergy who are embarked in

this unique ministry in our church. This sense of hope continued to build post the Deans Conference through the process of planning of our Art Show, Chapter meeting and Art Experiment at the New Britain Museum of American Art. It is evident to me that God is up to something in our midst as we are sent into the world to serve and participate in God's amazing mission as a cathedral community. The evolving collaborations with other congregations make this time relevant and fruitful in a meaningful way. Our Cathedral is connecting with various communities across ECCT. As a result of our Spring Experiments, we are forging new relationships with St. Mark's New Britain, St. Mary's, Manchester, Trinity, Lime Rock, among others. Hope for our ongoing work was palpable at our Chapter meeting on April 26. We gathered to continue our work as a follow- up to our planning meeting at Camp Washington and subsequent meetings of small groups.

The format of our meetings has changed. We have created space and opportunities for creativity and engagement. At this meeting we elected a new Chancellor, Michal Southwick. As expressed by a member of Chapter, "Revising our governance structure and making necessary governance changes will enable us to do the work that God is calling us to do in the mission field." I am very much looking forward to our Cathedral Congregations Forum on Sunday, May 1, following the 10 am service. The forum is a space to share with updates about the work of the Chapter and Spring Experiments as well as an opportunity to share our hopes, appreciations and concerns. Please join us!

Cathedral Apostles go to Trinity Lime Rock

"The Cathedral Visits!"

Those were the words written large in the April 17 space on the parish house wall calendar at Trinity Episcopal Church in Lime Rock. It was the welcome for 40 Cathedral members who took a bus from Hartford that Sunday morning to participate in a first-time bilingual service at the church in the Northwest corner of Connecticut.

Led by our Dean Miguelina Howell, the group was blessed on its journey by the Cathedral's 8 o'clock service attendees. With Canon Tim Hodapp and the Rev. Jay Cooke, they came onto the bus to wish the travelers well on their trip as apostles. All four Cathedral congregations - Saturday's Church by the Pond and Sunday's 8 and 10 a.m. and the 12:30 Spanish-speaking - were represented on the trip.

Lime Rock is a neighborhood in the village of Lakeville, where the boundaries of Connecticut, New York and Massachusetts meet. The visit by the Cathedral was the first experiment of serving as a resource to the Episcopal Church in Connecticut [ECCT], one of the concepts that came out of the Cathedral's discernment process.

Knowing that the Cathedral has experience in offering bilingual services, Trinity Church looked forward to the opportunity of learning more about how to foster inclusion with a diverse congregation. Founded in 1873, it has opened its doors to a growing number of Hispanics who live in the surrounding area.

The bilingual service at Trinity was a collaboration of both churches in providing musicians, choir singers and liturgical assistants. The service bulletin, in both English and Spanish, was produced by the Cathedral's staff. Trinity now has a format to follow in developing its own.

Dean Lina, in Spanish, and the Rev. Heidi Truax, in English, together gave the sermon. The Rev. Truax said it was "an incredible boost of confidence for our little parish, and a real feeling of solidarity with not only the Cathedral but also with the whole ECCT."

Following the service, a bountiful and delicious Latino-inspired lunch was provided. The Cathedral's own Hospitality Team contributed food to share. Fellowship between the two churches grew as everyone had the chance to get to know each other on a beautiful Sunday that allowed for walking about Trinity's lovely grounds.

On the trip home the consensus was clear: the day had been memorable in many ways, but especially in knowing that the Cathedral that Sunday was truly doing what a Cathedral does in the 21st century.

Celebrate Pentecost and International Day on May 15

Pentecost -which in Greek means the 50th day - takes place 50 days after Easter and commemorates the birth of the Christian community as described in the Book of Acts. International Day reminds us of our own diverse church community and of the many blessings we enjoy.

Food representing different cultures brought to the Fellowship Hour by members of all congregations adds to the festivity as will the varied selection of music. A main sign of Pentecost is the color red, symbolizing the joy and fire of the Holy Spirit. Plan now to be part of a wonderful celebration- and wear something red!

2016 Canon Clinton R. Jones Award Presentation to Dr. Dorothy Asch



On Friday, May 13, Dr. Dorothy Asch, a member of St. Thomas's Episcopal Church in New Haven, will receive the Ninth Annual Clinton R. Jones Award in recognition of her lifelong vocation of service to God and Church.

Since 2005 Christ Church Cathedral has annually recognized individuals whose life and work exemplify the values, accomplishments and passions similar to those of the late Rev. Canon Jones during 40 years of ministry at the Cathedral. He left a strong legacy of outreach and care to people with challenges in their lives. Past award recipients include persons involved in prison ministry, helping disabled children in Haiti, and providing support services for those with AIDS, experiencing mental illness, homelessness and poverty. Dr. Asch has always lived ahead of her time and has devoted much of her life to the theological education and spiritual formation of children. At age 94, she has touched the lives of many children over the decades. In many ways, she was a brave pioneer who paved the way for the women who followed her.

A graduate of Adelphi University where she earned a bachelor's degree in psychology, she also holds a divinity degree from Garrett Theological Seminary and a Ph.D. in theology from the University of Edinburgh. After earning her doctorate, she served in the U.S. Navy in the final years of World War II. A resident of Hamden, she continues to volunteer a significant amount of time to St. Thomas's Church which is known for its diverse and inclusive community. The Award Dinner on May 13 will begin at 6 p.m.
